Are you ready for your CSP?

If you're an active CSM, CSPO, or CSD who has reached that next level of experience and expertise in Scrum, distinguish yourself by earning your CSP certification.

To apply to become a CSP, you must satisfy three eligibility criteria:

1. Hold an **active CSM, CSPO, or CSD** certification.
2. Have a minimum of **36 months** of successful Agile/Scrum work experience within the past five years implementing Scrum inside organizations as a team member, product owner, or ScrumMaster.
3. Gather and submit **70 Scrum Education Units (SEUs)** from the past three years. Note that SEUs earned from attaining your CSM (up to 16 SEUs), CSD (up to 24 SEUs), and/or CSPO (up to 16 SEUs) certifications are eligible and can put you well on your way to earning your CSP.

3. Participate in coaching by a Certified Scrum Coach

8. Attend webinars, workshops, and other Scrum events
